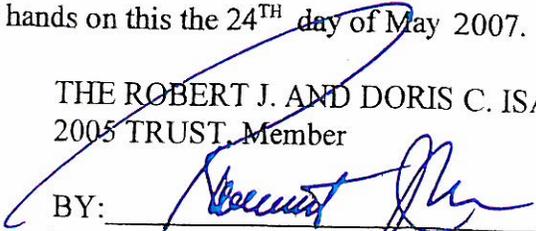

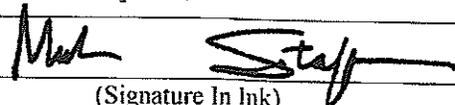

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1.0 PURPOSE: The purpose of this RFP is to solicit sealed proposals for pre-event/pre-negotiated (i.e. negotiated prior to the actual need based on occurrence of emergency) disaster service contracts between the Commonwealth of Virginia (COV) and resource contractors (Offerors). The contracts are for use by political jurisdictions within the COV acting under a local declaration of emergency and/or State Agencies representing the COV under the authority of the Governor or as outlined within a Governor's Declaration of Emergency. As part of the solicitation process, the COV will establish two groupings of Disaster Services Contracts:

The first group will be multiple award contracts. Contracts will be awarded to vendors that have nationwide asset capabilities able to respond to large-scale disasters with logistical and emergency response resources. This group shall be able to respond across the COV to a diverse range of disasters: manmade, biological, or natural.

The second group will be multiple award contracts, allowing smaller and local vendors to supply logistical and emergency response resources to State Agencies and Localities during small scale and local emergencies. This second group may submit their proposals based on commodities, resources, and services (Attachment D) and emergency response regions (Attachment E). Any Contractor submitting a proposal for this group shall be able to respond under emergency situation, with the commodities, resources, and/or services, in the regions identified in their proposal.

Offerors for both "groups" agree that by submission of a proposal, they are capable of and able to respond to request (s) for resources, commodities, and/or services by telephone within one hour of receiving notification. Offerors are required to provide emergency 24 hour contact information to be utilized during disasters. Failure to respond within one hour, five times over a period of three emergency events may result in removal from the contract. All offerors are strongly recommended to become familiar with the COV Title 44 Emergency Services and Disaster Laws.

Fixed priced, indefinite delivery contract (s) are to be awarded, only in preparation of or as a result of declared emergencies or disasters, through competitive negotiations, with multiple qualified contractors. The intent of the resulting contract(s) is to support the Virginia Department of Emergency Management (VDEM/Virginia Emergency Operations Center (VEOC)), and agents utilizing this solicitation, with requests for goods/equipment/services upon their official declaration of a local emergency. Contracts will be issued with no guaranteed quantity of goods/services, and the usage of this contract is wholly dependent upon the needs at the time of the emergency or disaster. Current information regarding this solicitation may be found at: www.eva.virginia.gov.

2.0 BACKGROUND: The Virginia Department of Emergency Management (VDEM) is a state agency that works closely with local government emergency managers, other state agencies, voluntary organizations, and federal agencies, such as the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), to ensure a comprehensive, efficient, and effective response to emergencies and disasters throughout the Commonwealth of Virginia (COV).

2.1 Information:

- a. For the purpose of this solicitation and any resulting contract(s), VDEM is referred to as the "Contracting Agency". Agencies utilizing the services described herein and provided as a result of any contract awards will be referred to as "Participating Agencies" or "Authorized Users".
- b. VDEM is responsible for:
 - i. Administering the resulting contract(s).

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- ii. Contract Changes, if required. Changes to the Scope of Work and or Contract will be made only upon executed approval of the Contracting Agency.
 - iii. Resolving disputes and interpreting terms and conditions.
- 2.2 Small, Women-Owned and Minority Business Participation: It is the policy of the COV to contribute to the establishment, preservation, and strengthening of small businesses and businesses owned by women and minorities and to encourage their participation in State procurement activities. The Commonwealth encourages Contractors to provide for the participation of small businesses and businesses owned by women and minorities through partnership, joint ventures, subcontracts, or other contractual opportunities. Submission of a report of past efforts to utilize the goods and services of such businesses and plans for involvement on this contract are required. By submitting a proposal, Offerors certify that all information provided in their response to this RFP is true and accurate. Failure to provide information required by the RFP will ultimately result in rejection of the proposal.
- 2.3 Any current emergency (statewide) contracts will remain in place until end dates specified and shall be replaced with contracts awarded through this solicitation process. Existing emergency contracts may be found at: www.eva.virginia.gov

3.0 STATEMENT OF NEEDS: The Virginia Department of Emergency Management (VDEM)/Virginia Emergency Operations Center (VEOC) is in need of an Emergency Response Company(s) (Offerors) that can provide equipment, goods, and services, to include additional manpower to provide assistance in emergencies and disasters. The Agency is looking for Contractors who would be able to respond to any of the following disasters: Hurricanes, Earthquakes, Tornadoes, Floods, Wildfires, Oil Spills, Ice Storms, hazardous Materials incidents, Terrorist Attacks, Weapons of mass destruction, disease-carrying vector control, Biological and Viral threats, Fires/explosions and other man-made or natural disasters. VDEM will need the contractor to provide personnel, equipment, goods and other material needed for the response to a disaster on an as-needed basis. The contractor(s) must have availability of a wide variety of emergency response and recovery resources such as generators, hazardous materials response equipment, disaster management personnel, see Attachment 2 for a more complete list of items. This Attachment is offered as a guide and is not intended to be a complete list of items that may be required. Offerors are encouraged to present a more comprehensive list of emergency items. The contractor(s) shall provide all labor, supervision, equipment, supplies, during or in preparation of emergencies and disasters as stated within to include loading, unloading, transportation to deliver, set-up if required, provide quality control, technical advice and reporting on all matters related to the contract. As requirements arise for specific quantities of items covered herein, the authorized individuals will place orders. **CONTRACTOR(S) SHALL PROVIDE EQUIPMENT, MATERIAL AND/OR ANY ASSOCIATED SERVICES WITH DUE DILIGENCE AND RAPID RESPONSIVENESS FOR THE DURATION OF THE EMERGENCY.**

3.1 Contractor Qualifications:

- a. The Contractor shall be able to demonstrate the availability of adequate resources to fulfill the responsibilities listed below. The Contractor shall include trained staff with experience in the local, state, and federal regulatory process.
- b. If required in response to the RFP, offeror must be available to make an oral presentation to VDEM program staff.

3.2 VDEM RESPONSIBILITIES: VDEM will furnish facilities, supplies, communications, and equipment at the Joint Field Office (JFO) to support the personnel supplied under this contract.

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- 3.3 SCHEDULE: Time is of the essence for performance of this Contract. The Contractor agrees and understands that the services covered by this Contract will be immediately available during times of emergencies and disasters. VDEM reserves the right, if necessary, to acquire part or all of the services offered by the Contractor under this Contract from other available resources as deemed necessary in the best interests of the Commonwealth to meet this requirement.

4.0 PROPOSAL PREPARATION AND SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS:

4.1 GENERAL REQUIREMENTS:

4.1.1 RFP Response: In order to be considered for selection, offerors must submit a complete response to the RFP. One (1) original and five copies of each proposal must be submitted to the issuing State agency. The offeror shall also submit one electronic copy (compact disc preferred) of their proposal in MS Word format (Microsoft Word 2003 or compatible format). In addition, the offeror shall submit a redacted (proprietary and confidential information removed) electronic copy of their proposal.

4.1.2 Proposal Preparation:

- a. An authorized representative of the offeror shall sign proposals. All information requested must be submitted. Failure to submit all information requested may result in the Purchasing Agency requiring prompt submission of missing information and/or giving a lowered evaluation of the proposal. The Purchasing Agency may reject proposals, which are substantially incomplete or lack key information. Mandatory requirements are those required by law or regulation or are such that they cannot be waived and are not subject to negotiation.
- b. It is the policy of the Commonwealth of Virginia to contribute to the establishment, preservation and strengthening of small businesses and businesses owned by women and minorities and to encourage their participation in State procurement activities. The Commonwealth encourages contractors to provide for the participation of small businesses and businesses owned by women and minorities through partnerships, joint ventures, subcontracts, or other contractual opportunities. Submission of a report of past efforts to utilize the goods and services of such businesses and plans for involvement on this contract are required. By submitting a proposal, offerors certify that all information provided in response to this RFP is true and accurate. Failure to provide information required by this RFP will ultimately result in rejection of the proposal.
- c. Proposals should be prepared simply and economically, providing a straightforward, concise description of capabilities to satisfy the requirements of the RFP. Emphasis should be on completeness and clarity of content.
- d. Proposals should be organized in the order in which the requirements are presented in the RFP. All pages of the proposal should be numbered. Each paragraph in the proposal should reference the paragraph number of the corresponding section of the

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RFP. It is also helpful to cite the paragraph number, sub-letter and repeat the text of the requirement as it appears in the RFP. If a response covers more than one page, the paragraph number and sub-letter should be repeated at the top of the next page. The proposal shall contain a table of contents, which cross-references the RFP requirements. Information, which the offeror desires to present, that does not fall within any of the requirements of the RFP should be inserted at an appropriate place or be attached at the end of the proposal and designated as additional material. Proposals that are not organized in this manner risk elimination from consideration if the evaluators are unable to find where the RFP requirements are specifically addressed.

- e. Each copy of the proposal shall be bound or contained in a single volume where practical. All documentation submitted with the proposal should be contained in that single volume.
 - f. Ownership of all data, materials and documentation originated and prepared for the State pursuant to the RFP shall belong exclusively to the State and be subject to public inspection in accordance with the Virginia Freedom of Information Act. Trade secrets or proprietary information submitted by an offeror shall not be subject to public disclosure under the Virginia Freedom of Information Act; however, the offeror must invoke the protections of Section 2.2-4342F of the *Code of Virginia*, in writing, either before or at the time the data or other material is submitted. The written notice must specifically identify the data or materials to be protected and state the reasons why protection is necessary. The proprietary or trade secret materials must be identified by some distinct method such as highlighting or underlining and must indicate only the specific words, figures, or paragraphs that constitute trade secret or proprietary information. The classification of an entire proposal document, line item prices and/or total proposal prices as proprietary or trade secrets is not acceptable and will result in rejection of the proposal.
 - g. All information requested by this RFP on the ownership, utilization and planned involvement of small businesses, women-owned businesses and minority-owned businesses must be submitted. If an offeror fails to submit all information requested, the purchasing agency may require prompt submission of missing information after the receipt of vendor proposals.
 - h. All offerors who submit a proposal shall be financially responsible.
- 4.1.3 **Oral Presentation:** Offerors who submit a proposal in response to this RFP may be required to give an oral presentation of their proposal to the State agency. This provides an opportunity for the offeror to clarify or elaborate on the proposal. This is a fact finding and explanation session only and does not include negotiation. The issuing State agency will schedule the time and location of these presentations. Oral presentations are an option of the Purchasing Agency and may or may not be conducted.

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4.2 SPECIFIC PROPOSAL REQUIREMENTS:

Proposals should be as thorough and detailed as possible so that the Purchasing Agency may properly evaluate your capabilities to provide the required services. Offerors are required to submit the following items as a complete proposal:

- 4.2.1 The complete RFP (including cover sheet) and all addenda acknowledgements, if any, signed and filled out as required.
- 4.2.2 Provide a letter of introduction. The contents of this letter must include the official name and address of the contractor submitting the proposal, and the name, address and telephone number of the person(s) who will be authorized to act on behalf of the offeror and bind the offeror to all commitments made in the proposal and negotiations. Briefly identify the benefits to the Commonwealth of using your firm's services instead of another firm's services – why contracting your firm's services would be the "best buy" for Virginia.
- 4.2.3 Completed Offerors Data Sheet, included as **Attachment A** to the RFP, and other specific items or data requested in the RFP.
- 4.2.4 A written narrative statement to include experience in providing the goods/services described herein and the demonstrated ability to provide Emergency Services. Offerors should include information substantiating their ability to provide adequate levels of service. Such information should include, but not be limited to:
 - Experience in providing the services described herein along with a description of company structure;
 - Approach to providing the service;
 - Names, qualifications and experience of personnel to be assigned to the project;
 - Offerors should clearly state the types of Emergency goods, equipment, and services they can provide;
 - Location of office(s) and hours of operation;
 - Describe your capability to offer a charge card payment program;
 - Location, size and number of hubs or distribution points, if applicable;
 - Description of facilities and operations that may be utilized in the performance of a declared emergency;
 - Specify whether or not an account manager(s) will be assigned. Describe fully any services provided through the account manager, such as site visits, consultation, problem and/or dispute resolution regarding shipments and invoices, etc;
 - Specific plans for providing the proposed services including: Offeror to show how they will provide the required services, to include **delivery procedures**. Also. include an explanation as to any planned use of sub-contractors;
 - Areas of the COV have been divided into seven (7) regions. Offerors shall be very clear as to where goods, equipment, and/or services are to be provided. That is, **regions are to be specified**; and
 - Pricing is to be inclusive of all costs (i.e. to include installation and delivery).
- 4.2.5 Return 12.0 ATTACHMENT C, identifying all proprietary information. (Note: Price cannot be declared proprietary, and neither can the entire proposal; therefore, do not place a confidential/proprietary statement at the beginning of the proposal that would apply to all pages, and do not place on every page. Also, do not copyright your proposal.)
- 4.2.6 The offeror must submit the following two attachments:

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- a. Planned involvement of small, women-owned and minority-owned businesses in the performance of the contract. (The format for submission of SWAM utilization plan data is included at Attachment 12.0 ATTACHMENT B herein).
- b. Proposed Price(s). Indicate in the pricing schedule section of the RFP.

5.0 EVALUATION AND AWARD CRITERIA:

5.1 EVALUATION PROCESS: All proposals will be reviewed and evaluated by an Evaluation Committee. "Best Value" concepts will be used for the evaluation and award. "Best Value" means the overall combination of quality, price, and various elements of required services that in total are optimal relative to a public body's needs. The Commonwealth will consider award to other than the lowest priced offeror or other than the highest technically acceptable offeror. The committee will recommend the proposal(s) that most closely meet the requirements of the Commonwealth.

5.2 EVALUATION CRITERIA: Proposals shall be evaluated by the Purchasing Agency using the following criteria:

8.0 REQUIRED GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

GOODS AND NONPROFESSIONAL SERVICES

- PIM 98-027 →
- A. **VENDORS MANUAL:** This solicitation is subject to the provisions of the Commonwealth of Virginia *Vendors Manual* and any changes or revisions thereto, which are hereby incorporated into this contract in their entirety. The procedure for filing contractual claims is in section 7.19 of the *Vendors Manual*. A copy of the manual is normally available for review at the purchasing office and is accessible on the Internet at www.eva.virginia.gov under "Vendors Manual" on the vendors tab.
 - B. **APPLICABLE LAWS AND COURTS:** This solicitation and any resulting contract shall be governed in all respects by the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia and any litigation with respect thereto shall be brought in the courts of the Commonwealth. The agency and the contractor are encouraged to resolve any issues in controversy arising from the award of the contract or any contractual dispute using Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) procedures (*Code of Virginia*, § 2.2-4366). ADR procedures are described in Chapter 9 of the *Vendors Manual*. The contractor shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, rules and regulations.
 - C. **ANTI-DISCRIMINATION:** By submitting their proposals, offerors certify to the Commonwealth that they will conform to the provisions of the Federal Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, as well as the Virginia Fair Employment Contracting Act of 1975, as amended, where applicable, the Virginians With Disabilities Act, the Americans With Disabilities Act and § 2.2-4311 of the *Virginia Public Procurement Act (VPPA)*. If the award is made to a faith-based organization, the organization shall not discriminate against any recipient of goods, services, or disbursements made pursuant to the contract on the basis of the recipient's religion, religious belief, refusal to participate in a religious practice, or on the basis of race, age, color, gender or national origin and shall be subject to the same rules as other organizations that contract with public bodies to account for the use of the funds provided; however, if the faith-based organization segregates public funds into separate accounts, only the accounts and programs funded with public funds shall be subject to audit by the public body. (*Code of Virginia*, § 2.2-4343.1E).

In every contract over \$10,000 the provisions in 1. and 2. below apply:

- 1. During the performance of this contract, the contractor agrees as follows:
 - a. The contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religion, color, sex, national origin, age, disability, or any other basis prohibited by state law relating to discrimination in employment, except where there is a bona fide occupational qualification reasonably necessary to the normal operation of the contractor. The contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.
 - b. The contractor, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the contractor, will state that such contractor is an equal opportunity employer
 - c. Notices, advertisements and solicitations placed in accordance with federal law, rule or regulation shall be deemed sufficient for the purpose of meeting these requirements.
- 2. The contractor will include the provisions of 1. above in every subcontract or purchase order over \$10,000, so that the provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor.

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- D. **ETHICS IN PUBLIC CONTRACTING:** By submitting their proposals, offerors certify that their proposals are made without collusion or fraud and that they have not offered or received any kickbacks or inducements from any other offeror, supplier, manufacturer or subcontractor in connection with their proposal, and that they have not conferred on any public employee having official responsibility for this procurement transaction any payment, loan, subscription, advance, deposit of money, services or anything of more than nominal value, present or promised, unless consideration of substantially equal or greater value was exchanged.
- E. **IMMIGRATION REFORM AND CONTROL ACT OF 1986:** By entering into a written contract with the Commonwealth of Virginia, the Contractor certifies that the Contractor does not, and shall not during the performance of the contract for goods and services in the Commonwealth, knowingly employ an unauthorized alien as defined in the federal Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986.
- F. **DEBARMENT STATUS:** By submitting their proposals, offerors certify that they are not currently debarred by the Commonwealth of Virginia from submitting proposals on contracts for the type of goods and/or services covered by this solicitation, nor are they an agent of any person or entity that is currently so debarred.
- G. **ANTITRUST:** By entering into a contract, the contractor conveys, sells, assigns, and transfers to the Commonwealth of Virginia all rights, title and interest in and to all causes of action it may now have or hereafter acquire under the antitrust laws of the United States and the Commonwealth of Virginia, relating to the particular goods or services purchased or acquired by the Commonwealth of Virginia under said contract.
- H. **MANDATORY USE OF STATE FORM AND TERMS AND CONDITIONS FOR RFPs:**
- I. Failure to submit a proposal on the official state form provided for that purpose may be a cause for rejection of the proposal. Modification of or additions to the General Terms and Conditions of the solicitation may be cause for rejection of the proposal; however, the Commonwealth reserves the right to decide, on a case by case basis, in its sole discretion, whether to reject such a proposal.
- I. **CLARIFICATION OF TERMS:** If any prospective offeror has questions about the specifications or other solicitation documents, the prospective offeror should contact the buyer whose name appears on the face of the solicitation no later than ten working days before the due date. Any revisions to the solicitation will be made only by addendum issued by the buyer.
- J. **PAYMENT:**
- I. **To Prime Contractor:**
 - a. Invoices for items ordered, delivered and accepted shall be submitted by the contractor directly to the payment address shown on the purchase order/contract. All invoices shall show the following:
 - Contract number or purchase order number;
 - Social security number (for individual contractors) or the federal employer identification number (for proprietorships, partnerships, and corporations);
 - Name, position, billing rate, hours of work, and total amount being billed (if staffing costs are incurred);
 - All billing rates shall be at state per diem rates (if applicable);
 - Any billing for travel shall be allowable only within the COV; and
 - Other billing requirements as may be deemed appropriate.
 - b. Any payment terms requiring payment in less than 30 days will be regarded as requiring payment 30 days after invoice or delivery, whichever occurs last. This shall not affect offers of discounts for payment in less than 30 days, however.

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- c. All goods or services provided under this contract or purchase order, that are to be paid for with public funds, shall be billed by the contractor at the contract price, regardless of which public agency is being billed.
 - d. The following shall be deemed to be the date of payment: the date of postmark in all cases where payment is made by mail, or the date of offset when offset proceedings have been instituted as authorized under the Virginia Debt Collection Act.
 - e. **Unreasonable Charges.** Under certain emergency procurements and for most time and material purchases, final job costs cannot be accurately determined at the time orders are placed. In such cases, contractors should be put on notice that final payment in full is contingent on a determination of reasonableness with respect to all invoiced charges. Charges which appear to be unreasonable will be researched and challenged, and that portion of the invoice held in abeyance until a settlement can be reached. Upon determining that invoiced charges are not reasonable, the Commonwealth shall promptly notify the contractor, in writing, as to those charges which it considers unreasonable and the basis for the determination. A contractor may not institute legal action unless a settlement cannot be reached within thirty (30) days of notification. The provisions of this section do not relieve an agency of its prompt payment obligations with respect to those charges which are not in dispute (*Code of Virginia, § 2.2-4363*).
2. To Subcontractors:
- a. A contractor awarded a contract under this solicitation is hereby obligated:
 - (1) To pay the subcontractor(s) within seven (7) days of the contractor's receipt of payment from the Commonwealth for the proportionate share of the payment received for work performed by the subcontractor(s) under the contract; or
 - (2) To notify the agency and the subcontractor(s), in writing, of the contractor's intention to withhold payment and the reason.
 - b. The contractor is obligated to pay the subcontractor(s) interest at the rate of one percent per month (unless otherwise provided under the terms of the contract) on all amounts owed by the contractor that remain unpaid seven (7) days following receipt of payment from the Commonwealth, except for amounts withheld as stated in (2) above. The date of mailing of any payment by U. S. Mail is deemed to be payment to the addressee. These provisions apply to each sub-tier contractor performing under the primary contract. A contractor's obligation to pay an interest charge to a subcontractor may not be construed to be an obligation of the Commonwealth.
3. Each prime contractor who wins an award in which provision of a SWAM procurement plan is a condition to the award, shall deliver to the contracting agency or institution, on or before request for final payment, evidence and certification of compliance (subject only to insubstantial shortfalls and to shortfalls arising from subcontractor default) with the SWAM procurement plan. Final payment under the contract in question may be withheld until such certification is delivered and, if necessary, confirmed by the agency or institution, or other appropriate penalties may be assessed in lieu of withholding such payment.
4. The Commonwealth of Virginia encourages contractors and subcontractors to accept electronic and credit card payments.

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- K. **PRECEDENCE OF TERMS:** The following General Terms and Conditions *VENDORS MANUAL*, APPLICABLE LAWS AND COURTS, ANTI-DISCRIMINATION, ETHICS IN PUBLIC CONTRACTING, IMMIGRATION REFORM AND CONTROL ACT OF 1986, DEBARMENT STATUS, ANTITRUST, MANDATORY USE OF STATE FORM AND TERMS AND CONDITIONS, CLARIFICATION OF TERMS, PAYMENT shall apply in all instances. In the event there is a conflict between any of the other General Terms and Conditions and any Special Terms and Conditions in this solicitation, the Special Terms and Conditions shall apply.
- L. **QUALIFICATIONS OF OFFERORS:** The Commonwealth may make such reasonable investigations as deemed proper and necessary to determine the ability of the offeror to perform the services/furnish the goods and the offeror shall furnish to the Commonwealth all such information and data for this purpose as may be requested. The Commonwealth reserves the right to inspect offeror's physical facilities prior to award to satisfy questions regarding the offeror's capabilities. The Commonwealth further reserves the right to reject any proposal if the evidence submitted by, or investigations of, such offeror fails to satisfy the Commonwealth that such offeror is properly qualified to carry out the obligations of the contract and to provide the services and/or furnish the goods contemplated therein.
- M. **TESTING AND INSPECTION:** The Commonwealth reserves the right to conduct any test/inspection it may deem advisable to assure goods and services conform to the specifications.
- N. **ASSIGNMENT OF CONTRACT:** A contract shall not be assignable by the contractor in whole or in part without the written consent of the Commonwealth.
- O. **CHANGES TO THE CONTRACT:** Changes can be made to the contract in any of the following ways:
1. The parties may agree in writing to modify the scope of the contract. An increase or decrease in the price of the contract resulting from such modification shall be agreed to by the parties as a part of their written agreement to modify the scope of the contract.
 2. The Purchasing Agency may order changes within the general scope of the contract at any time by written notice to the contractor. Changes within the scope of the contract include, but are not limited to, things such as services to be performed, the method of packing or shipment, and the place of delivery or installation. The contractor shall comply with the notice upon receipt. The contractor shall be compensated for any additional costs incurred as the result of such order and shall give the Purchasing Agency a credit for any savings. Said compensation shall be determined by one of the following methods:
 - a. By mutual agreement between the parties in writing; or
 - b. By agreeing upon a unit price or using a unit price set forth in the contract, if the work to be done can be expressed in units, and the contractor accounts for the number of units of work performed, subject to the Purchasing Agency's right to audit the contractor's records and/or to determine the correct number of units independently; or
 - c. By ordering the contractor to proceed with the work and keep a record of all costs incurred and savings realized. A markup for overhead and profit may be allowed if provided by the contract. The same markup shall be used for determining a decrease in price as the result of savings realized. The contractor shall present the Purchasing Agency with all vouchers and records of expenses incurred and savings realized. The Purchasing Agency shall have the right to audit the records of

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the contractor as it deems necessary to determine costs or savings. Any claim for an adjustment in price under this provision must be asserted by written notice to the Purchasing Agency within thirty (30) days from the date of receipt of the written order from the Purchasing Agency. If the parties fail to agree on an amount of adjustment, the question of an increase or decrease in the contract price or time for performance shall be resolved in accordance with the procedures for resolving disputes provided by the Disputes Clause of this contract or, if there is none, in accordance with the disputes provisions of the Commonwealth of Virginia *Vendors Manual*. Neither the existence of a claim nor a dispute resolution process, litigation or any other provision of this contract shall excuse the contractor from promptly complying with the changes ordered by the Purchasing Agency or with the performance of the contract generally.

- P. **DEFAULT:** In case of failure to deliver goods or services in accordance with the contract terms and conditions, the Commonwealth, after due oral or written notice, may procure them from other sources and hold the contractor responsible for any resulting additional purchase and administrative costs. This remedy shall be in addition to any other remedies which the Commonwealth may have.
- Q. **TAXES:** Sales to the Commonwealth of Virginia are normally exempt from State sales tax. State sales and use tax certificates of exemption, Form ST-12, will be issued upon request. Deliveries against this contract shall usually be free of Federal excise and transportation taxes. The Commonwealth's excise tax exemption registration number is 54-73-0076K.
- R. **USE OF BRAND NAMES:** Unless otherwise provided in this solicitation, the name of a certain brand, make or manufacturer does not restrict offerors to the specific brand, make or manufacturer named, but conveys the general style, type, character, and quality of the article desired. Any article which the public body, in its sole discretion, determines to be the equivalent of that specified, considering quality, workmanship, economy of operation, and suitability for the purpose intended, shall be accepted. The offeror is responsible to clearly and specifically identify the product being offered and to provide sufficient descriptive literature, catalog cuts and technical detail to enable the Commonwealth to determine if the product offered meets the requirements of the solicitation. This is required even if offering the exact brand, make or manufacturer specified. Normally in competitive sealed bidding only the information furnished with the bid will be considered in the evaluation. Failure to furnish adequate data for evaluation purposes may result in declaring a bid nonresponsive. Unless the offeror clearly indicates in its proposal that the product offered is an equivalent product, such proposal will be considered to offer the brand name product referenced in the solicitation.
- S. **TRANSPORTATION AND PACKAGING:** By submitting their proposals, all offerors certify and warrant that the price offered for FOB destination includes only the actual freight rate costs at the lowest and best rate and is based upon the actual weight of the goods to be shipped. Except as otherwise specified herein, standard commercial packaging, packing and shipping containers shall be used. All shipping containers shall be legibly marked or labeled on the outside with purchase order number, commodity description, and quantity.
- T. **INSURANCE:** By signing and submitting a bid or proposal under this solicitation, the bidder or offeror certifies that if awarded the contract, it will have the following insurance coverage at the time the contract is awarded. For construction contracts, if any subcontractors are involved, the subcontractor will have workers' compensation insurance in accordance with §§ 2.2-4332 and 65.2-800 et seq. of the *Code of Virginia*. The bidder or offeror further certifies that the contractor and any subcontractors will maintain these insurance coverage during the entire term of the contract and that all insurance coverage will be provided by insurance companies authorized to sell insurance in Virginia by the Virginia State Corporation Commission.

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MINIMUM INSURANCE COVERAGES AND LIMITS REQUIRED FOR MOST CONTRACTS:

1. Workers' Compensation - Statutory requirements and benefits. Coverage is compulsory for employers of three or more employees, to include the employer. Contractors who fail to notify the Commonwealth of increases in the number of employees that change their workers' compensation requirements under the Code of Virginia during the course of the contract shall be in noncompliance with the contract.
2. Employer's Liability - \$100,000.
3. Commercial General Liability - \$1,000,000 per occurrence. Commercial General Liability is to include bodily injury and property damage, personal injury and advertising injury, products and completed operations coverage. The Commonwealth of Virginia must be named as an additional insured and so endorsed on the policy.
 (Note to Agency/Institution: When the requirement is for parking facilities and garages for motor vehicle maintenance contracts, the forgoing sentence should be changed to read: These coverage should include Garage Owner's Liability. Contracts with movers or truck transporters should also require motor carrier's liability. When in the judgment of a procurement officer, these limits and coverage are not warranted for the goods and services being procured, the Division of Risk Management should be contacted.)
4. Automobile Liability - \$1,000,000 per occurrence. (Only used if motor vehicle is to be used in the contract.)

- U. **ANNOUNCEMENT OF AWARD:** Upon the award or the announcement of the decision to award a contract over \$50,000, as a result of this solicitation, the purchasing agency will publicly post such notice on the DGS/DPS eVA web site (www.eva.virginia.gov) for a minimum of 10 days.
- V. **DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE:** During the performance of this contract, the contractor agrees to (i) provide a drug-free workplace for the contractor's employees; (ii) post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, a statement notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, sale, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of a controlled substance or marijuana is prohibited in the contractor's workplace and specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violations of such prohibition; (iii) state in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the contractor that the contractor maintains a drug-free workplace; and (iv) include the provisions of the foregoing clauses in every subcontract or purchase order of over \$10,000, so that the provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor.

If the award of this contract is made to a faith-based organization and an individual, who applies for or receives goods, services, or disbursements provided pursuant to this contract objects to the religious character of the faith-based organization from which the individual receives or would receive the goods, services, or disbursements, the public body shall offer the individual. within a reasonable period of time after the date of his objection, access to equivalent goods, services, or disbursements from an alternative provider.
- X. **eVA BUSINESS-TO-GOVERNMENT VENDOR REGISTRATION:** The eVA Internet electronic procurement solution, website portal www.eVA.virginia.gov, streamlines and automates government purchasing activities in the Commonwealth. The eVA portal is the gateway for vendors to conduct business with state agencies and public bodies. All vendors desiring to provide goods and/or services to the Commonwealth shall participate in the eVA Internet e-procurement solution either through the eVA Basic Vendor Registration Service or eVA Premium Vendor Registration Service. All offerors must register in eVA; failure to register will result in the bid/proposal being rejected.
 - a. eVA Basic Vendor Registration Service: \$25 Annual Registration Fee plus the appropriate order Transaction Fee specified below. eVA Basic Vendor Registration Service includes electronic order receipt, vendor catalog posting, on-line registration, electronic bidding, and the ability to research historical procurement data available in the eVA purchase transaction data warehouse.
 - b. eVA Premium Vendor Registration Service: \$25 Annual Registration Fee plus the appropriate order Transaction Fee specified below. eVA Premium Vendor Registration Service includes all benefits of the eVA Basic Vendor Registration Service plus automatic email or fax notification of solicitations and amendments.

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- c. For orders issued prior to August 16, 2006, the Vendor Transaction Fee is 1%, capped at a maximum of \$500 per order.
- d. For orders issued August 16, 2006 and after, the Vendor Transaction Fee is:
 - (i) DMBE-certified Small Businesses: 1%, capped at \$500 per order.
 - (ii) Businesses that are not DMBE-certified Small Businesses: 1%, capped at \$1,500 per order.

The eVA transaction fee will be invoiced approximately 30 days after the corresponding purchase order is issued and payable 30 days after the invoice date. Any adjustments (increases/decreases) will be handled through purchase order changes.

DMBE-certified small businesses are those businesses that hold current small business certification from the Virginia Department of Minority Business Enterprise. This shall not exclude DMBE-certified women-owned and minority-owned businesses when they have received the DMBE small business certification. For purposes of award, offerors shall be deemed small businesses if and only if they are certified as such by DMBE on the **due date** for receipt of proposals.
- AA. **BID PRICE CURRENCY:** Unless stated otherwise in the solicitation, offerors shall state offer prices in US dollars.
- BB. **AUTHORIZATION TO CONDUCT BUSINESS IN THE COMMONWEALTH:** A contractor organized as a stock or nonstock corporation, limited liability company, business trust, or limited partnership or registered as a registered limited liability partnership shall be authorized to transact business in the Commonwealth as a domestic or foreign business entity if so required by Title 13.1 or Title 50 of the *Code of Virginia* or as otherwise required by law. Any business entity described above that enters into a contract with a public body pursuant to the *Virginia Public Procurement Act* shall not allow its existence to lapse or its certificate of authority or registration to transact business in the Commonwealth, if so required under Title 13.1 or Title 50, to be revoked or cancelled at any time during the term of the contract. A public body may void any contract with a business entity if the business entity fails to remain in compliance with the provisions of this section.

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9.0 SPECIAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

GOODS AND NONPROFESSIONAL SERVICES

1. **ADVERTISING** In the event a contract is awarded for supplies, equipment, or services resulting from this bid/proposal, no indication of such sales or services to the (name of institution) will be used in product literature or advertising. The contractor shall not state in any of its advertising or product literature that (name of agency/institution) has purchased or uses any of its products or services, and the contractor shall not include (name of agency/institution) in any client list in advertising and promotional materials..
2. **ASBESTOS:** Whenever and wherever during the course of performing any work under this contract, the contractor discovers the presence of asbestos or suspects that asbestos is present, he shall stop the work immediately, secure the area, notify the building owner and await positive identification of the suspect material. During the downtime in such a case, the contractor shall not disturb any surrounding surfaces but shall protect the area with suitable dust covers. In the event the contractor is delayed due to the discovery of asbestos or suspected asbestos, then a mutually agreed extension of time to perform the work shall be allowed the contractor but without additional compensation due to the time extension.

 - 7.1 **AWARD TO MULTIPLE OFFERORS:** Selection shall be made of two or more offerors deemed to be fully qualified and best suited among those submitting proposals on the basis of the evaluation factors included in the Request for Proposals, including price, if so stated in the Request for Proposals. Negotiations shall be conducted with the offerors so selected. Price shall be considered, but need not be the sole determining factor. After negotiations have been conducted with each offeror so selected, the agency shall select the offeror which, in its opinion, has made the best proposal, and shall award the contract to that offeror. The Commonwealth reserves the right to

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make multiple awards as a result of this solicitation. The Commonwealth may cancel this Request for Proposals or reject proposals at any time prior to an award, and is not required to furnish a statement of the reasons why a particular proposal was not deemed to be the most advantageous (*Code of Virginia, § 2.2-4359D*). Should the Commonwealth determine in writing and in its sole discretion that only one offeror is fully qualified, or that one offeror is clearly more highly qualified than the others under consideration, a contract may be negotiated and awarded to that offeror. The award document will be a contract incorporating by reference all the requirements, terms and conditions of the solicitation and the contractor's proposal as negotiated. To the maximum extent permitted by applicable law, the contractor will not be liable under this contract for an indirect, incidental, special or consequential damages, or damages from loss of profits, revenue, data or use of the supplies, equipment and/or services delivered under this contract. This limitation of liability will not apply, however, to liability arising from: (a) personal injury or death; (b) defect or deficiency caused by willful misconduct or negligence on the part of the contractor; or (c) circumstances where the contract expressly provides a right to damages, indemnification or reimbursement.

33. **LIQUIDATED DAMAGES:** (Note: Review the guidance contained in the General Comments and Procedures below before deciding to include one of the following clauses in a solicitation.

42. CORRECTIVE OR PREVENTIVE MAINTENANCE: The contractor shall provide necessary corrective or preventive maintenance, required testing and inspection, calibration and/or other work necessary to maintain the equipment in complete operational condition during the warranty period.
43. PRICE ESCALATION/DE-ESCALATION: Price adjustments may be permitted for changes in the contractor's cost of materials not to exceed the increase in the following index/indices: CPI. No price increases will be authorized for one year after the effective date of the contract. Price escalation may be permitted only at the end of this period and each 120 days thereafter and only where verified to the satisfaction of the purchasing office. 51. **RENEWAL OF CONTRACT:**

B. **RENEWAL OF CONTRACT:** This contract may be renewed by the Commonwealth for three successive one year periods) under the terms and conditions of the original contract. Price increases may be negotiated only at the time of renewal. Written notice of the Commonwealth's intention to renew shall be given approximately 90 days prior to the expiration date of each contract period.

2. 56. **WARRANTY (COMMERCIAL):** The contractor agrees that the goods or services furnished under any award resulting from this solicitation shall be covered by the most favorable commercial warranties the contractor gives any customer for such goods or services and that the rights and remedies provided therein are in addition to and do not limit those available to the Commonwealth by any other clause of this solicitation. 57. **WORK SITE DAMAGES:** Any damage to existing utilities, equipment or finished surfaces resulting from the performance of this contract shall be repaired to the Commonwealth's satisfaction at the contractor's expense.

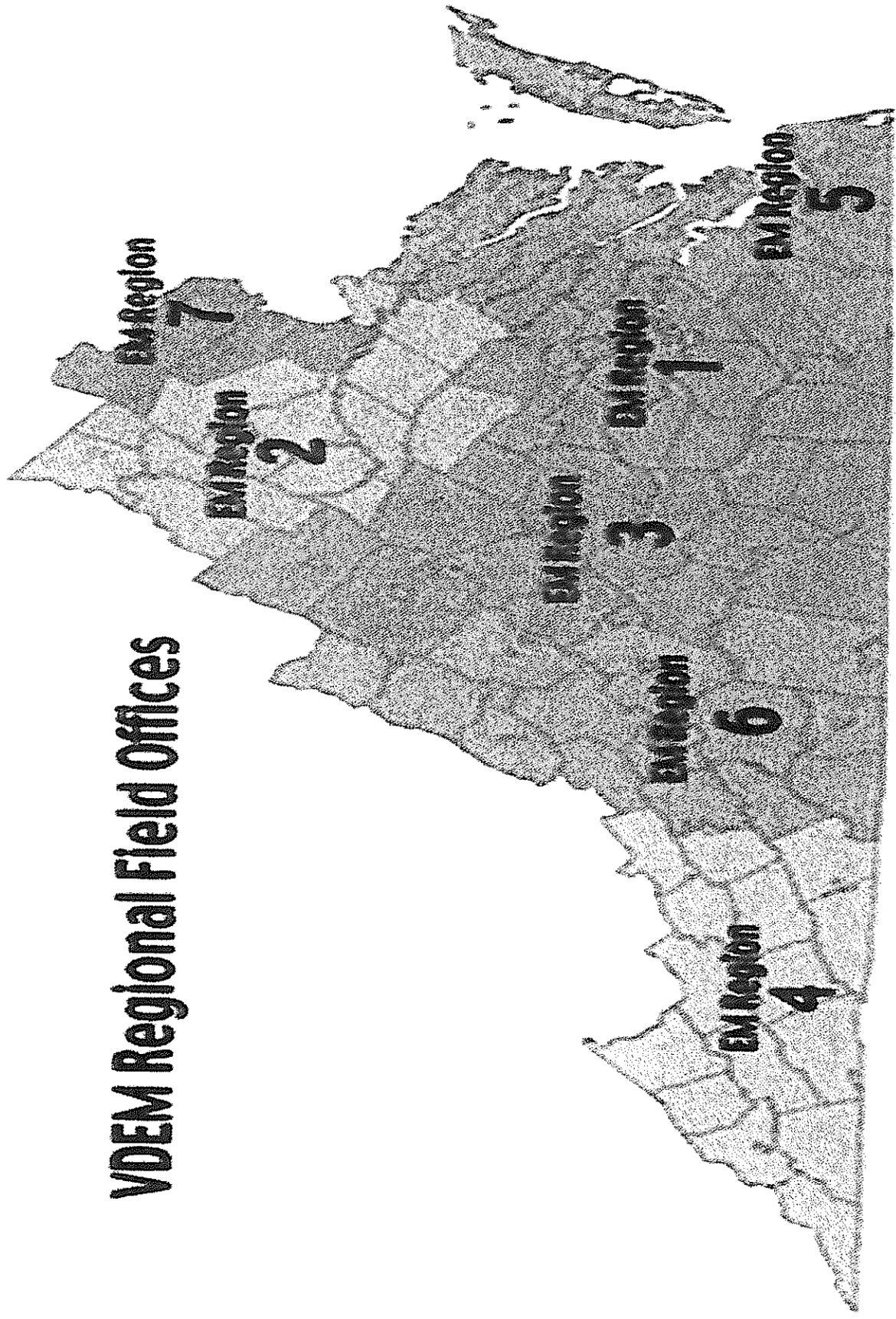

Therefore, in the event that the "offeror" identifies any item(s) that should be included as part of their "proposal" that would be otherwise deemed as "required" in order for the resource, commodity, or service to function properly, be operational, or to meet the scope or intended purpose for which it would be requested, the "offeror" understands that the item will be included in their price for the item noted unless otherwise agreed upon by all parties.
- The pre-identified commodity list provided within Attachment D is not intended to be an "all inclusive" list of resource, commodity, or service needs for the Commonwealth of Virginia. This list, as provided, is a general listing of resources, commodities, and services commonly requested by the Commonwealth of Virginia but is not limited to resources, commodities, or services that may be requested during an emergency.

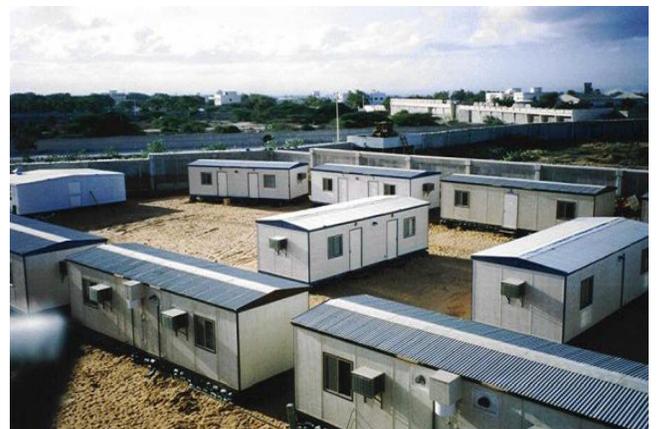

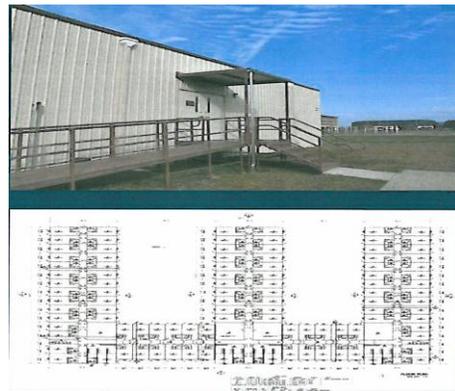

FINANCIAL STRENGTH AND STABILITY

The DRC Group is, financially, one of the strongest groups in its industry and class. DRC has managed and completed dozens of multimillion dollar contracts in its nearly 20-year history. By offering a diverse array of high-quality professional services, DRC has maintained its financial soundness at times when other companies in the industry have struggled to perform. DRC has a healthy base of corporate assets in real property, equipment, funds, and credit and is financially capable of responding to any event or challenge. Some highlights of DRC's financial capability:

- Over the past 4 years, DRC has averaged over \$100,000,000 in gross revenue per year.
- DRC has a total bonding capacity of at least \$100,000,000.
- DRC is capable of insuring projects in any amount and our key coverages are unlimited in amount.
- In 2008, following Hurricanes Ike and Gustav, DRC provided debris removal services for 36 separate contracts, including the cities of New Orleans, Houston, and Galveston. These were simultaneously provided disaster management services. The total value of these contracts is currently estimated at \$200,000,000.00
- In 2005-2006, DRC mobilized, performed, and completed a contract of over \$100,000,000 for the Louisiana Department of Transportation and Development in response to Hurricane Katrina while performing on numerous other projects across the nation.
- During the 2004 Hurricane season, DRC worked 37 separate contracts performing a total of over \$150,000,000 in emergency work, and recovering of over 10,000,000 cubic yards of debris in a four and half month period. Throughout this entire period, all subcontractors were paid on a weekly basis, even though DRC often had to wait up to 30 to 60 days for interim invoice payments.
- DRC has not failed to complete any work awarded to it, has not defaulted on any contracts, has met all financial contractual obligations, has never entered into bankruptcy, and is not the subject of any litigation or liens regarding financial performance or subcontractor payment.

KEY PERSONNEL

Key personnel of DRC Emergency Services, LLC (DRC ES) and the DRC family of affiliated and associated companies, which includes DRC Pacific, subcontractors, contract reservists and associate personnel, have been involved in hurricane emergency responses for many years, since as early as 1961. For the past 20 years, the DRC team has responded to major natural or man-made disasters occurring within the continental United States and its territories, in theatres of U.S.-led troop operations, and in Central America. The DRC personnel are trained, motivated and available for immediate deployment in an emergency response. Personnel are N.I.M.S.-certified and/or have specialized training in safety and asbestos management and are equipped with utility vehicles, digital, handheld, multi-state, two-way radios, cellular communications, and handheld computers. DRC personnel will have the experience and/or training to respond

immediately to disasters and are provided with a DRC ES supervisor handbook including required reports and forms for successful disaster response and management thereof.

Regional Managers are assigned to specific geographic locations throughout the United States to assist, monitor and lead the project teams in response to emergency situations. Regional Managers from one region may be assigned to support other Regional Managers as needed and all Regional Managers may be mobilized to one location to support emergency situations.

Professional Recognition

DRC ES and its affiliates are leaders in the field of disaster management and emergency recovery. DRC ES and affiliate employees, subcontractors, associates, and contract reservist personnel have specialized training for emergency management and/or have attended multiple industry seminars and conferences. DRC ES, its subcontractors, and/or personnel list among their accomplishments, membership in many professional organizations including NEMA, APWA, SWANA and the Society of American Military Engineers. DRC and/or its' affiliates, associates and/or subcontractors are licensed General Contractors in the states in which DRC performs disaster response services. DRC ES is familiar with USACE, FEMA, and FHWA rules and regulations, the Stafford Act, and 44CFR as they pertain to emergency response, recovery and reimbursement.

Senior Management

Robert J. Isakson is the Managing Director and largest shareholder of The DRC Group (DRC), comprised of a number of specialized U. S. and International companies which provide construction, logistics, marine and disaster services worldwide. DRC provides emergency logistics, reconstruction, debris management and removal, reduction, landfill management, incineration, tree trimming and arborist services, marine salvage and reconstruction, recycling, underground utility construction and debris removal, heavy construction, levee repair, vertical construction and hazardous waste removal, remediation and recycling services throughout the world. DRC also provides temporary housing, temporary and portable jails, life support, and explosive ordnance removal services. DRC has responded to numerous wars, insurrections, (including recent contracts in war-torn Kuwait, Somalia, Kosovo, and Iraq) hurricanes, earthquakes, tornadoes, typhoons, floods, fires, and ice storms since its inception in 1989. DRC is currently listed in the top 100 ENR Specialty Contractors for 2009 and has worked up to forty-three (43) separate, simultaneous major disaster projects simultaneously throughout multiple states and throughout the world. Mr. Prieur has worked extensively in East Baton Rouge, St. Tammany, St. Charles, and Plaquemines Parishes on the Hurricane Katrina Louisiana DOTD project and throughout Texas and Louisiana in recovery efforts for Hurricane's Ike and Gustav. Mr. Prieur started his own business in 1985, with the acquisition of a full service gas station. His business expanded to own and manage four stations. Mr. Prieur served as a liaison to Shell Oil on Dealer Related Issues as well as served as a consultant to Shell Oil for purposes of developing a new business model. He also owned and managed a full service financial services company for six years. He majored in accounting at the University of Louisiana-Lafayette and is certified in Asbestos Supervision and N.I.M.S.

Data Manager

Ms. Jannetta Allison joined the DRC Group in 2004 to direct the Data Processing Division. The Data Division is responsible for recording all debris removal performed in the field. Debris removal responsibilities include truck certifications, load and haul tickets, tower reports and damage reports. Data processing is also responsible for any other specialty paperwork or call centers that might arise. Ms Allison travels to on site locations to train and set up equipment for the satellite office staff as well as the tower monitors. The Data Division maintains a full time

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staff of five and manages archived material needed for FEMA audits on DRC Contracts. During Hurricanes Ike and Gustav (2008-2009), the division received at least ten requests for archived information for previous hurricanes as far back as 2004. The information requested included copies of tickets, truck certifications and information regarding disposal sites.

Since joining DRC, Jannetta has supported ten hurricanes, four ice storms and three tornados, in which the data division have billed over \$450,000,000.00 for debris removed in at least sixty different communities. The largest contract was debris removal for the City of Houston. DRC removed over 10,000,000 yards of debris, a record for debris removal. Jannetta's staff of five expanded to include eighty temporary employees that worked twenty four hours a day, seven days a week for three months.

The Data Division is currently upgrading the way information from the field is updated and how the invoicing process is used. This update will also improve how that information is gathered, stored and communicated to their field personnel as well as their clients.

AVAILABLE EQUIPMENT

The DRC GROUP (DRC), which includes DRC Emergency Services, DRC, Inc, Equipment Leasing (EQL), and associated and affiliated companies and subcontractors, owns substantial trucks and specialized pieces of heavy equipment, attachments and support equipment specifically designed for emergency response. DRC owns dozens of cellular and radio telephones for use in an emergency. DRC ES, DRC and/or their subcontractors have national priority contracts with multiple national equipment leasing companies and subcontractors and/or independent contractors through which hundreds of trucks and/or pieces of heavy loading equipment are available to supplement DRC's and/or the subcontractor's fleets. In summary, DRC ES is capable of mobilizing all of the listed equipment and more, as needed, to meet the clearing requirements of a Notice to Proceed.

EMERGENCY SERVICES PLAN

Mobilization

Prior to initiation of the contract, DRC/Base Logistics will arrange agreements with local and regional vendors for supplies and rentals such as tents, trailers, laundry facilities, catering, staffing, hotel facilities, etc. DRC/Base Logistics will work with VDEM to pre-identify and prearrange, insofar as is possible, potential service sites. DRC/Base Logistics will be prepared to mobilize, if necessary, dozens to hundreds of contractors and reservists from DRC's personnel base to ensure adequate and timely staffing of each operational camp.

Within 24-48 hours of an impending event, DRC/Base Logistics will contact the Virginia Department of Emergency Management to determine the level of alert. Based on alert level, DRC/Base Logistics will begin deployment of sufficient resources to pre-arranged "safe zones" designated in each region.

Within 24 hours of a Notice to Proceed, DRC/Base Logistics will deploy sufficient resources and equipment to provide management, supply, and oversight of Emergency Services for governmental entities and political subdivisions of the State of Virginia. Once the storm/event has passed and following a Notice to Proceed, DRC/Base Logistics will deploy appropriate materials, personnel, and resources to the designated site(s), including on-site catering units; tents; cabins and/or trailers; ice; water; generators; foodstuffs; sanitation facilities; refrigeration units; etc. Facilities will be ready for occupancy and fresh, hot meals prepared for occupants well within the 24-72-hour time frame.

Operations

DRC/Base Logistics will provide management and oversight of each of the seven regions as specified in the RFP:

- Region 1 - Richmond
- Region 2 - Culpepper
- Region 3 - Central
- Region 4 - Southwest
- Region 5 - Tidewater
- Region 6 - Roanoke Area
- Region 7 - Northern Virginia

DRC/Base Logistics' deployments will be staffed by experienced management and logistics personnel, who have extensive experience in support of governmental operations, including numerous emergency camps and life support contracts in post disaster and post war environments. DRC/Base Logistics will deploy an on-site Program Manager to provide oversight, execution, and quality control and will assign a Command Center Response Manager to each region listed above to coordinate sufficient staffing, resources, equipment, and supplies from a central location. DRC/Base Logistics, in accordance with the intent of the Stafford Act, will make extensive use of local subcontractors, vendors, suppliers, and resources to provide material, rentals, foodstuffs, equipment, and services to each camp.

Employment of Local Subcontractors

DRC has implemented an aggressive and nationally recognized outreach program entitled, "The DRC Local Subcontractor Resource Program."

DRC is dedicated to working closely with local, minority and Women Business Enterprise's (M/WBE) small business representatives in contacting companies that are approved and certified by M/WBE as small, disadvantaged, minority, veteran and women owned businesses. DRC will make immediate contact with the Minority and Women Business Enterprise office to schedule an informational workshop for potential vendors and businesses. The workshops provide "hands on" technical assistance to companies offering a variety of goods and services. DRC is committed to ensuring that local companies are made aware of all potential contracting and partnership opportunities. In addition, due to the close nature to the federal funding provided by FEMA, The Congressional Delegation will be contacted and their staffs briefed on the program for their constituent companies.

The development and implementation of this program is coordinated by Tom B. Combs. Mr. Combs, Director of Governmental Relations, has over 20 years experience in SMWB development. Mr. Combs served as founder and Executive Director of The Bid Resource Center that was the nation's second and largest non-profit assisting SMWB'S in securing government contacts. Subsequently Mr. Combs served as Mayor Pro Tem and Congressional Chief of Staff and Director of the John Gray Institute developing SMWB programs across the state of Texas and the nation. The DRC technical assistance workshops not only assist companies with identifying potential contract opportunities, but also assist those interested with "teaming". This process matches MBE's/WBE's with other companies in order to strengthen their competitive position and package of goods and services offered. "Teaming" can greatly increase MBE/WBE participation because of the "strength in numbers" concept. DRC is committed to ensuring that any emergency response business activity is shared by the entire community.

Facilities

DRC/Base Logistics can provide quarters for 1000 persons or more if requested in the form of tented camps, bunk trailers, cabins, and/or prearranged local hotel facilities as requested and/or required by the circumstances and/or the client. Facilities will be supplied with sufficient beds, cots, bunks, air mattresses, linen sets, and/or sleeping bags to provide comfortable, individual sleeping and living space (45 square feet per occupant) for each camp occupant. Sufficient generator power and HVAC units will be deployed to provide comfortable and safe climate

control in all facilities in accordance with all applicable local, state, and federal codes. Facilities will be equipped with fire extinguishers, UL listed lighting equipment, and cell phone charging stations.

Water

Each Emergency Services location can be equipped with approximately 50 shower heads, 50 hand wash stations and 100 portable restroom facilities. Shower units will be serviced with an ASME rated propane water heater and an anti scald safety valve. Heated water shall be provided at a minimum of 101 degrees Fahrenheit. Disposable work kits (plastic basin, soap, hand towel, bath towel, and wash cloth) can be provided to each camp occupant. Diapers, wipes, and necessary sanitary products will be provided for the care of very young children and infants.

Potable water can be provided by truck in cases where local/municipal water sources are not available and/or have been compromised. Similarly, grey and black water treatment will be site specific with all alternatives from treatment to haul-off available. Where possible and advantageous, treatment units may be deployed to Emergency Service sites. In most cases, grey and black water will be removed by truck and disposed of in accordance with all local, state, and federal requirements.

Catering

On-site catering units, fully-equipped base camp kitchens, food supply trailers, and cold storage units are available to provide healthy and safe meals to Emergency sites at least three times per day. Meals are served in accordance with a rotating menu program. Meals typically include a balance of meat and other proteins (at least 6 ounces), vegetables, fruit, carbohydrates, and dessert. Hot coffee, tea, water, and snacks are available 24 hours a day at a service bar.

Quality sack or box lunches will be provided both at the camp site and/or at designated job sites. These are normally equipped with a cold gel pack to ensure freshness. Ovo-lacto vegetarian meals can be provided as an alternative as necessary or desired. Catering operations are typically staffed with a 12-person catering crew, a catering manager, and a supply chain coordinator. Food stocks are bulk selected, purchased, and provided by DRC/Base Logistics and shipped to each camp to ensure freshness, availability, and quality. Age-appropriate foodstuffs, baby food, and formula are provided for babies and toddlers.

Laundry

Each emergency site/base camp can be supplied with two fully staffed mobile laundry units, each with typically at least 7 sets of laundry machines that are each capable of 36 cycles per day. Additionally, prearranged local vendors/facilities will be utilized to augment laundry services as necessary. This would enable each camp occupant access to laundry facilities with maximum 24-hour turnaround. Laundry services will also provide clean linens for all applications daily.

Medical Units

A qualified medical unit will be staffed with rotation of at least one RPN/LPN/NP and one nurse's assistant for each shift and will be equipped with basic first aid and sick bay equipment

as well as life support equipment typical of that supplied to a paramedic/first responder. Medical services will be provided 24 hours 7 days a week.

MWR Units

Morale, welfare, and recreation units capable of accommodating at least 50 people will be provided to each Emergency Service location. MWR units are large, single room facilities equipped with several television/DVD/VCR units, computer stations with internet access, seating areas with tables and chairs, cell phone charging stations, reading materials, vending machines with snacks and beverages, a gaming area with ping-pong and billiard tables, etc.

Administrative Area

Each Emergency Services site will be equipped with one to two office trailers capable of accommodating both contractor and governmental administrative staffs. Trailers will be climate controlled and equipped with office furniture, computing and printing facilities, and telecommunications service.

Power

DRC/Base Logistics can provide a full range of generators for Emergency Services. Base/DRC can also provide reverse cycle ECUs and/or other units capable of controlling the ambient temperature in all living and dining spaces to maintain a temperature of 72 degrees Fahrenheit.

Light Towers

DRC/Base Logistics can provide portable light stanchions as needed to provide a safe, secure, well-lit environment for the entire camp area and perimeter 24 hours a day.

Codes and Regulations

All components of each Emergency Services location will be in conformity with all local, state, and federal safety and code requirements.

ADA Compliance

It is the policy of DRC to comply with all the relevant and applicable provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). DRC will not discriminate against any qualified employee or job applicant with respect to any terms, privileges, or conditions of employment because of a person's physical or mental disability. DRC will also make reasonable accommodation wherever necessary for all employees or applicants with disabilities, provided that the individual is otherwise qualified to safely perform the essential duties and assignments connected with the job and provided that any accommodations made do not impose an undue hardship on DRC. All emergency structures will be in conformity with all applicable ADA requirements with appropriate ramps, portals, lifts, etc.

Sanitation

Solid waste collection and disposal will be provided. Waste and litter bins will be cleared daily and/or as required by the contractor's staff. Solid waste will be collected in on-site dumpsters which will be cleared daily and/or as required, as well. All emergency facilities will be cleaned at

least daily and all dining/food facilities will be cleaned following each meal by Contractor-provided staff. Entire base premises will be kept clean and sanitary at all times.

Demobilization

Base/DRC is capable of demobilizing/dismounting emergency services/camp assets immediately upon notice of impending event and of immediately remounting said assets as necessary following such an event.

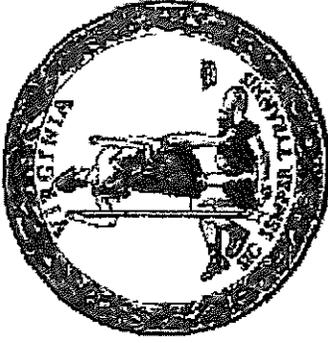

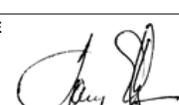

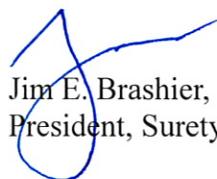
