SITUATION REPORT 21

1330 Hours September 25, 2005

WEATHER

Forecast: *Partly sunny with high temperatures in the 80's. Winds will be light and variable. Tonight, partly cloudy, lows in the mid 60's with light and variable winds.*

EXECUTIVE ACTION

EOC Activation: The Virginia EOC is at Increased Readiness Condition.

State of Emergency: On September 23, 2005, Governor Warner extended the Declaration of Emergency with all the regulatory and deployment powers already granted for Hurricane Katrina, to cover the Commonwealth's response to Hurricane Rita. The Commonwealth will directly assist evacuees who arrive in Virginia from the states that have suffered unprecedented damages from either or both of these devastating storms. Governor Warner reiterated Virginia is ready to shelter evacuees at Town Pickett. The Governor directed the Virginia Emergency Operations Center (VEOC) to coordinate state relief efforts in response to Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. The President approved Governor Warner's request for an emergency declaration on September 10, 2005. The incident period began on August 29, 2005 authorizing 100% federal funding for Public Assistance Category B (emergency protective measures). The assistance is for all 95 counties and 40 independent cities in the Commonwealth of Virginia.

OPERATIONS SECTIONS

State Warning Point: Continuing to receive and disseminate situation reports from Hurricanes Rita and Katrina impacted states.

EMAC: The total number of personnel from Virginia deployed through EMAC is 603. The total number of EMAC personnel from Virginia in the impacted areas today is 168. The VEOC is coordinating **22** open requests through Emergency Management Assistance Compact (EMAC). The Online EOC has posted the latest EMAC requests for state and/or local agency response. Currently supporting **5** EMAC missions in Louisiana and 4 in Mississippi. **Eight** missions are complete.

Chesterfield County – A 7 person Incident Management Team from Chesterfield County deployed to the New Orleans Fire Emergency Operations Center. The County's Mobile Command Post and 4 personnel deployed to Baton Rouge in support of Louisiana State Police. Ten personnel deployed to Mississippi with Law Enforcement Task Force # 1. A total of 21 personnel deployed.

Northern Virginia Localities - Two ten-person Incident Management Teams from the region deployed to assist the New Orleans Emergency Operations Center. VDEM Regional Coordinator deployed with one of the teams. Virginia Department of Fire Programs (VDFP) Division Chief 7 deployed with one of these teams. Six-person Incident Management Team deployed to the NASA Complex Mississippi. Four-person IMT deployed to Louisiana Office of Emergency Management in Baton Rouge. Thirty-person IMT deployed to Harrison County Mississippi for State Emergency Management Office. Fifty-person fire fighting task force with equipment deployed to Hancock County Fire Command. A total of 110 personnel deployed from the region.

Henrico County – Five personnel deployed with Law Enforcement Task Force #1 to Mississippi.

TOWN PICKETT

The Commonwealth is in close communication with FEMA regarding the transfer of evacuees from states impacted by Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. **As of 1300, today, FEMA requested Virginia remain on stand-by through Monday, September 26, to receive evacuees.** Administrative and security staffs remain at Town Pickett and all agencies are on standby for implementation within 12 hours.

VIRGINIA EVACUEES

FEMA and Red Cross registrations indicate that there may be as many as 15,000 people in Virginia who evacuated from the areas impacted by Hurricane Katrina. The impact of Hurricane Rita evacuees on the Commonwealth is unknown at this time.

Red Cross reports 3,576 applicants (1 applicant per household – 7,907 people). The largest numbers continue to be in Hampton Roads and Northern Virginia.

FEMA reports 5,364 applicants (1 applicant per household). FEMA provided information from their database to VDEM on Friday, September 23. Discussions with FEMA continue concerning the implementation of the regular FEMA Individuals and Households Program (IHP) for evacuees and the interaction with new programs.

Government Programs Assisting Evacuees:

Department of Social Services has enrolled 2,348 in the “e-Medicaid” health care assistance program administered by the Department of Medical Assistance. Washington County DSS, local Red Cross chapter and other partners set up a facility as a Red Cross center near Bristol, Virginia to assist Hurricane Katrina evacuees entering the Commonwealth as they travel North on Interstate 81. For approximately 8 days, a Red Cross station was set up inside the Virginia Welcome Center at Mile Marker 1 on Interstate 81N. More than 800 people passed through the facility and received food, water, etc. On September 23, local DSS began counting Hurricane Rita evacuees throughout Virginia.

In addition to VDSS, the following federal and state agencies continue to provide assistance to evacuees: U.S. Department of Agriculture, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Virginia Department of Education, Head Start, Virginia Council on Higher Education, WIC, Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development, Virginia Housing Authority, Virginia Employment Commission and Virginia Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services.

STATE ACTIVITIES

Virginia Department of Mines, Minerals & Energy (DMME) – EPA has held Virginia’s request for a wider area reformulated gasoline (RFG) waiver to gather more information. They are waiting to see evidence of stations closing for lack of RFG. They said that Miller Oil, the major BP supplier in Tidewater, could pull more than its allocation (about ½ of its normal volume) by paying a \$1/gallon surcharge. EPA says it, by law, cannot look at price. We discussed with EPA that BP is enforcing its allocation with the surcharge, so that the allocation should be considered a limit. DMME will monitor the supply situation moving forward. The EPA has a conference call with the American Petroleum Institute, the pipeline association, and the National Petrochemical and Refiners Association at 1:00 today. EPA should know more about the supply situation after this call. The New York Mercantile Exchange will open a special trading session for petroleum products at 11:00 a.m. instead of 7:00 p.m. tonight. This should give a picture of gasoline prices, which should be reflective of supplies. Hurricane Rita’s path took it over the Lake Charles/Beaumont/Port Arthur area. This area is home to 7 refineries with 1.72 million-barrels/day refinery capacity. The US Department of Energy estimates it may take another day or two before a clear picture is available of refinery capacity. Initial reports show the Valero Port Arthur Texas (255,000 bpd) will be out of service for about 2 weeks. The Motiva (Shell) Port Arthur, Texas (285,000 bpd) refinery has some damage, no time estimate on repair time. Crews should be assessing the Exxon-Mobil Beaumont, Texas (348,500 bpd) refinery today. No news yet on other Lake Charles LA/Port Arthur-Beaumont, Texas refineries. The hurricane path moved

away from the Houston/Texas City area, home to 9 refineries with 2.29 million-barrels/day refinery capacity. Reports indicate limited or no damage to petroleum/petrochemical plants in the Houston area. One refinery is asking employees to come back to work today. Colonial Pipeline was at about 50% capacity on its main lines Saturday. It had power at its origin points at Houston and Pasadena Texas, but had power outages in other Texas/Western Louisiana locations. It had power on its system from Krotz Springs, Louisiana eastward. It has some pre-positioned portable generating capacity to move to pumping stations without power. Colonial Pipeline is feeding trunk lines out of breakout tanks. DMME has heard reports of a 2-day delay in a gasoline pipeline delivery to the Richmond/Chesapeake area. Plantation Pipeline is working at 100% capacity. Approximately 99.125% of offshore Gulf of Mexico oil production was shut in and 72.04% of offshore Gulf of Mexico natural gas production was shut in. The Louisiana Offshore Oil Port (LOOP) resumed deliveries from tank storage yesterday. State (VDOT/DGS) supplies are adequate. EPA extended the reformulated gasoline (RTF) waiver for Richmond by one week to midnight, Sept. 30, 2005. The dyed diesel waiver for on-road use remains in effect through Oct 5, 2005.

Virginia Department of Emergency Management – Six Community Relations Reservists returned to Virginia on Saturday, September 24, 2005.

Department of Transportation – An ample supply of gasoline is available for normal operations for approximately 58 days, and diesel fuel supply for approximately 37 days.

Virginia Department of Forestry (VDOF) - There are 20 personnel deployed to Mississippi to manage a food and supply distribution center. Two people are in Texas preparing for Hurricane Rita response (VICC request). A total of 22 personnel are deployed.

Virginia State Police (VSP) – Deployed 22 personnel with Law Enforcement Task Force #1 to Mississippi through EMAC.

Virginia Department of Game & Inland Fisheries (VDGIF) - Deployed 10 personnel with Law Enforcement Task Force #1 to Mississippi through EMAC.

Virginia Department of Health (VDH) - VDH completed availability survey of acute care, nursing home/long term facility and mental health bed capacity statewide. The current snapshot of available beds, subject to change per hospital admissions, indicates 1,362 critical care beds available statewide, 175 Nursing Home and Assisted Living Beds, and 50 psychiatric beds (state facilities and private hospitals). VDH is supporting Town Pickett readiness efforts and a Medical Support element remains on 12-hour standby. Town Pickett lab/testing services arrangements have been approved through Center for Medicaid/Medicare Services (provider Hospital lab to bring copy of CLIA certificate to the site and notify VDH CQHS&CP of the scope and date service implemented). Automated callout methodology established to alert key Pickett Health staff in the event of after-hours activation. Airport evacuee triage, if needed, to be coordinated through RIC with VCU Medical Control Center IAW existing Central Region MCI Plan. Virginia Disaster Medical Assistance Team (DMAT)-1 – A 33 person deployment team and a five person Medical Strike Team are staged in San Antonio, Texas in support of Hurricane Rita. Prince William County Environmental Health manager deployed to Louisiana. Lenowisco Health District food safety specialist deployed on 09/16 with Red Cross to San Antonio, Texas, working in public affairs at Kelly Air Force Base. There are also 2 Office of Chief Medical Examiner (OCME) personnel, in support of DMORT operations and 1 VDH Public Information Officer deployed to Texas in support of FEMA. Fifteen Medical Reserve Corp groups have been activated, most through Red Cross, for deployment in support of local operations and target area support

operations. Forty-two (42) MRC personnel are deployed on out-of-state missions, including 5 personnel from Roanoke Health Department (Red Cross mission), and 49 are supporting operations in Virginia, for a total of 91 MRC personnel.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

Citizen Corps volunteers are assisting with local emergency management efforts in support of Hurricane Katrina and Hurricane Rita relief efforts across the state. Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) volunteers have been deployed through their local Red Cross chapters. Medical Reserve Corp personnel deployments are reflected above in the VDH report.

Virginia VOAD volunteers are providing assistance to storm impacted states. Southeast Virginia VOAD – several volunteers have been trained by the Southeast Virginia Red Cross chapter to help with registration of evacuees at Town Pickett.

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
