


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



Above: On August 23, 2011, an earthquake with a magnitude of 5.8 struck Louisa County in Mineral, Virginia, causing extensive damage.

WHAT IS AN EARTHQUAKE?


An earthquake is a sudden, rapid shaking of the earth caused by the shifting of rock beneath the earth's surface. Earthquakes strike without warning, at any time of year, day or night. Forty-five U.S. states and territories are at moderate to very high risk of earthquakes. Though earthquakes in Virginia are rare, it's important to be aware of the potential threat and to have an earthquake readiness plan. BEFORE AN EARTHQUAKE: PREPARE YOUR HOME





Install strong latches or bolts on cabinets. Large or heavy items should be closest to the floor.



Anchor top-heavy, tall and freestanding furniture such as bookcases, TVs and china cabinets to wall studs to keep these from toppling over.

DURING AN EARTHQUAKE

INSIDE:

- "Drop, Cover and Hold On" Drop down, take cover under a sturdy desk, table or bench, or against an inside wall and hold on.
- » Do not use elevators.
- » Stay away from glass, windows, outside doors and walls.
- » Stay away from bookcases or furniture that is not secure and could fall.
- » Stay indoors until the shaking stops and you're sure it's safe to exit.

OUTSIDE:

» If you are outdoors, find a clear spot away from buildings, trees and utility lines.

IN A CAR:

- » Stop as quickly as safety permits.
- » Avoid stopping near or under buildings, trees, overpasses and utility lines.
- » Proceed cautiously after the earthquake has stopped, watching for road and bridge damage.
- » Do not attempt to drive across bridges or overpasses that have been damaged.

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION:

» Listen to and become familiar with your public transportation emergency plans.

AFTER AN EARTHQUAKE

- » If you are away from home, return only when authorities say it is safe to do so.
- » After an earthquake, the disaster may continue. Expect and prepare for potential aftershocks or landslides.
- » Look for and extinguish small fires. Fire is the most common hazard after an earthquake.
- » Check on neighbors after an emergency.

IF YOU ARE TRAPPED UNDER DEBRIS:

- » Do not light a match to assist with visibility.
- » Cover your mouth with a handkerchief or clothing.
- » Tap on a pipe or wall so rescuers can find you.
- » Shout only as a last resort shouting can cause you to inhale dangerous amounts of dust.

2011 LOUISA COUNTY EARTHQUAKE

THE 2011 LOUISA QUAKE WAS FELT ACROSS MORE THAN A DOZEN U.S. STATES



Felt by more people than any other earthquake in U.S. history: An estimated 1/3 of the U.S. population felt the quake.

CAUSED BETWEEN \$200 AND \$300 MILLION IN DAMAGES

OF WHICH ONLY ABOUT \$100 MILLION WAS INSURED

DAMAGES INCLUDED

- » North Anna Nuclear Generating Station
- » Charlottesville Gas Leak
 - » Lake Jackson Dam
- » Washington Monument

THE FURTHEST LANDSLIDE FROM THE EPICENTER WAS 150 MILES

GREATEST DISTANCE RECORDED FROM ANY EARTHQUAKE OF SIMILAR MAGNITUDE.

DAMAGE FROM THE QUAKE WAS REPORTED AS FAR AWAY AS BROOKLYN, NEW YORK
